## Ge and Custead in the CNTC-B Final

In Ge vs. Soderstrom, it was a toss up after <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> with Soderstrom in the lead by 2 IMPs. In the 4<sup>th</sup> stanza, the truck that ran over Bedard in the third quarter came over and ran over Soderstrom. Clearly somebody has to find the license number of that truck. Leading by 2 IMPs after 48 boards, Ge took 63 IMPs to Soderstrom's 32 and won the semi by a convincing 29 IMPs.

After the train wreck in the third quarter as Terri Bedard said herself, "When you are behind by 44 IMPs with 16 boards to play, you have to play flat out bridge." They bid every close game and, unfortunately, many of them went down 1. At the other table of course, the Custead team played nice conservative bridge and let the IMPs come home to them. When the dust cleared, it was 146-85 for Custead, but the match was not as unbalanced as the score would indicate. Basically, Custead scored a number of empty netters in the last stanza, but the Bedard team was quick not to make excuses. They got beat, fair and square and, like any good team, they were classy to the end.

In fact, the Soderstrom team also exhibited real class as they accepted their bronze medals from the CBF executive. Once again congratulations to Soderstrom and Bedard and good luck to Ge and Custead.

## Foster and Gordon in the CWTC final

In both CWTC semi-finals, it started one way and just kept going the same way right to the end. Foster ended up winning by 150-132, but each match was tight with the margins at 6, 11, 15, 18. Connell put up a steady fight, but were not up to the challenge this year.

In the other match, Gordon also won every segment. Because there was no reporting of the last segment, the director declared the Gordon win by a score of 130 to 105. The margin was, in all likelihood, greater than that as the experienced squad from central Canada ground away steadily on the Vancouver foursome. Last year, Kathy Adachi and her contingent (different squad from this year) were among the classiest players at the event, quietly walking away from the playing room to let the 2002 victors and their supporters celebrate without interference. This year, Adachi clearly selected the same calibre of class. Once the bronze medals were presented and the obligatory picture taken, they rushed off to congratulate the winners. All of us can take a really big lesson from a group of ladies who have taught me a whole bunch about winning and LOSING at this game we all love. Congratulations to Connell and to Adachi and good luck to Foster and Gordon.

The final 72 board marathon begins early tomorrow. Quarterly results will be posted on the Web Site.

### **Home Stretch Commentary**

Well, it is after lunch on Friday and the results of the first of 5 matches in the Flight A are available. Some interesting home stretch moves.

Fergani and MacIntyre still top the field, but are now tied. Herold and Maksymetz both had small losses and ended exactly where they started, tied for 3<sup>rd</sup>/4<sup>th</sup>. Sinno, once as high as 3<sup>rd</sup> has dropped off a little and now sits in 5<sup>th</sup> all alone. A new entry into the qualifiers is the team named for Petar Nagy (deceased) in memory of his name by a group of good friends including John Carruthers, Robert Lebi, George Mittelman, and Joseph Silver (an article elsewhere features this remarkable gesture). Rounding out the field is Thurston in sole possession of 7<sup>th</sup> and Todd/Kramer, each holding onto a piece of the final qualifying slot with a single fingernail each. There are lots of teams within reach yet and even the bottom of the field are 2 blitzes away from qualifying.

After the second round of the day (Round 18) of the Round Robin), not a whole lot changed except for some rearranging of the deck chairs on the Titanic. Fergani is back in 1<sup>st</sup>, MacIntyre has retreated to 2<sup>nd</sup>. Maksymetz is alone in 3<sup>rd</sup> and Sinno has jumped a place to 4<sup>th</sup>. Herold had a rough round and dropped to 5<sup>th</sup> with Thurston a single Victory Point behind in 6<sup>th</sup>. Up again, down again Kramer is 7<sup>th</sup> with Nagy sitting in the 8<sup>th</sup> hole in a dead tie with Pocock Todd, Treble, Gartaganis, Nowlan, Carriere, and Flock are all within 15 Victory Points out of the qualifying zone with 3 matches yet to play. Still can't count most of the field out with 3 matches left.

At the supper break, the teams at the top continue to jockey for position. Fergani in 1<sup>st</sup> with MacIntyre in 2<sup>nd</sup> - a full 39 VPs

ahead of Sinno in 3<sup>rd</sup>. Thurston is on a sustained march - now a single Victory Point behind Sinno and a whole 2 Victory Points ahead of Maksymetz to hold 4<sup>th</sup> with Maksymetz in 5<sup>th</sup>. Herold has dropped once again to 6<sup>th</sup> with Nagy in 7<sup>th</sup>. Tied for 8<sup>th</sup>/9<sup>th</sup> are Pocock and Kramer a single Victory Point out of the qualifiers. It will clearly take 300+ Victory Points to go through to the quarter finals and while there are several teams with a mathematical chance, really only Treble has a realistic chance to make the top 8<sup>th</sup>, sitting in 10 place now with 286, 5 VPs below the cut.

The penultimate match saw some interesting swings. With Fergani and MacIntyre still atop the standings and looking very much like they will finish  $1^{st}/2^{nd}$ , there is lots of action down below. Nagy had a screaming match to come all the way into 3<sup>rd</sup>. Right behind, a single Victory Point away, is Thurston and Maksymetz tied for 4<sup>th</sup> /5<sup>th</sup> and Sinno drops all the way from  $3^{rd}$  to  $6^{th}$ . Treble, with a nice match, came back into the standings at 7<sup>th</sup> and Herold with a small loss, held onto 8<sup>th</sup>. The cutoff is 309 Victory Points and there are 3 teams with over 300 that do not, at this juncture, qualify. Moreover there are 4 others between 290 and 300 and they cannot be discounted. I would be guessing, but it looks like anybody who needs 19 Victory Points better than the lowest qualifier to get into the money has somewhere between a slim chance and no chance at all. However, it looks like 15 teams have a chance to qualify even at this late date.



## Fergani Wins Right to Choose

The Fergani team went to the CNTC-A final in Edmonton last year only to fall to the Maksymetz team on the last Monday. This week, playing like men possessed, they lost only 3 matches and ended with an impressive 387 Victory Points to win the race to the wire and the right to choose their opponent in the quarter finals. Closely behind by 6 Victory Points were the MacIntyre team who dedicate their quality finish in honour of their non-playing captain who passed away in Ottawa on Thursday evening (see story on the passing of Laurie MacIntyre). Behind MacIntyre sits the other team with a non-playing captain in memoriam to a good friend, the Nagy team with 333. Last year's gold medalists, Maksymetz, qualified 4<sup>th</sup> with Paul Thurston, the chairman of Canada Bridge Week 2004, right behind in 5<sup>th</sup>. Treble, in and out for much of the week ended IN finishing  $6^{th}$  and Sinno, once as high as  $3^{rd}$ , finished a respectable 7<sup>th</sup>. The Herold team held on to 8<sup>th</sup> in a squeaker with Carriere missing by 1, Kramer by 2 and both Todd and Pocock by 4.

The quarter finals go tomorrow and you can't count anyone out. Remember, last year, Maksymetz finished in the last qualifying space by 1 Victory Point and ended up with all the marbles. Tomorrow is the second season and everybody starts pretty much equal.

Just as the venue locked up for the night the matchups for the quarter finals were announced:

- Fergani chose Sinno.
- MacIntyre chose Treble.
- Nagy chose Herold.
- Maksymetz plays Thurston.

I have my favorites and you certainly have yours. By the end of the day we'll see who is right.

## Players take Time to Visit the Links

Jim Priebe reports that Al Smith won the Bridge Week Golf Championship with a 77 (funny, we never heard that this championship was running...good thing too - half of the matches would have been defaulted due to a lack of players). He also reports that Bruce Gowdy got the award for the most birdies. Arno Hobart was the winner of the big hitter contest (from tee to back of green in 2 shots on a 591 yard par 5). The group played at Twin Lakes and report that both the course and the scenery are beautiful. We hope that every golf fanatic will take a little time before heading home to try one or more of the championship quality courses in the area.

### **Semi-Finals Commentary**

Things seem to be going just about the way the 2 event winners calculated in their choice of opposition. For the CWTC after 16 boards, Foster had a slight lead on Connell (43-37) in what looked to be a pretty swingy match, while Gordon was making pretty steady, if unspectacular, work of Adachi (29-19).

On the CNTC-B side, Ge is having their hands full with Soderstrom (29-27) but if they maintain the trend, they should eliminate a tough opponent early. In the 4<sup>th</sup> match, things are not going well for Bedard where Custead jumped out to an early 33-18 lead. This could be an upset in the making, but 16 boards do not a match make. We wait excitedly for the half time results to see if any kind of overwhelming lead is beginning to appear in any of the 4 matches.

At the half, the Bedard team seems to have corrected what was ailing them and erased the first quarter deficit and more, leading the match by 48 to 43.

In the other semi-final, there is a hint that history may be repeating itself. Winning the second stanza by 8 IMPs, Soderstrom has moved ahead of Ge by 64-58. This is certainly not a winning margin, but with last year very much on their minds, the Ge contingent must be wondering if they are snake bit.

On the distaff side, nothing changes, Foster increases their lead over Connell now ahead 11 IMPs (77-66). Having 6 well experienced warriors on the Gordon team seems to be wearing down the valiant Adachi squad who came so close last year but have no extra pair to spell anybody off. The half time score is 83-55 in Gordon's favour. Playing a grueling Round Robin and then right into 64 more boards has to be telling.

This may be the appropriate time to let a little strategy out of the bag. The 2002 winners from Edmonton were scheduled to play in this event, but, once again, only

being 4 and facing 128 boards over 2 days on Sunday and Monday, they opted to give this year's event a pass and come into the qualifying round fresh and ready to play. Whether it will be enough is anybody's guess, but they have all their guns cleaned and lubricated and they are looking for bear.

As the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter results were released, the Bedard team were trying to find out if anyone had the number of the truck that had run over them. Custead racked up a 40 IMP lead with 16 boards to go. It may be all over for the Calgary contingent at the hands of the team from Saskatoon and Prince Albert, Saskatchewan. In the other match, Ge has his hands full and more with the <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> result as close to a tie as you could wish for. Ge trails Soderstrom 99-97 and this Ottawa and vicinity team might send Ge home after the semis for the second straight year.
